### GRAIN UPDATE Keith Newman, Grain Department Manager

Even with the growing conditions that we have experienced this past season most producers in Southwest Minnesota have been very pleasantly surprised with their yields on both corn and soybeans. The amount of grain we have handled this year at New Vision has been unprecedented. The fall soybean receipts were 110% higher than the 2020 fall receipts and fall corn receipts are expected to be 105% - 110% higher than 2020. The quality of the crop has been very good despite the weather.

By the end of this harvest, I would anticipate that New Vision will have approximately 6.6 million bushels of corn and 500,000 bushels of soybeans on the ground. We will get about 2.15 million bushels of the corn covered and all the beans will be covered. 1.7 million bushels of ground piled corn at Marna will be covered and an additional 450 thousand bushels covered at Alpha

location which will allow New Vision to carry the grain longer to capture additional market opportunities. Weather permitting, our goal is to have uncovered ground piles up by the 1st of the year.

Most producers have experienced excellent yields this fall and are finding that they have extra bushels to sell. The market has given us some great opportunities to sell 2021 corn and soybeans, but don't forget about the 2022 and 2023 crop! As of this writing harvest corn for 2022 is above 5.00/bu and beans are above 11.00/bu, harvest corn for 2023 is above 4.50/bu and beans are closer to 11.00/bu.

These values for harvest 2022 and 2023 are at historically good values and producers should consider selling a portion of those crops. If you have interest in discussing marking options for the 2021 crop, the 2022

### FEED UPDATE Grant Prins, Feed Department Manager

The new Premier Tech PTH-920 bagger, installed in Worthington, is fully operational and is working to our expectations. The new bagging line also includes a new sewing head from Union Special that offers features of an HMI screen for simple sewing. Head adjustments as well as an Inkjet Coder to give us multiple options for printing various things on the crepe tape when closing the bag. These options include, manufacture date, lot code, logo, etc. The new line also features an automatic tagger that places the tag inline with the bag as it enters the sewing head. These features allow the operator to monitor the process and restock the machine with empty bags as needed while allowing the bagging process to continue.

The new six bin tower with the dual inlet swing set to allow both product lines to hit any of the six bins is working well also. The new bins are smooth walled versus the corrugated previous tower which has improved clean-out to eliminate product contamination. We are excited for this new equipment to help us streamline our bagging operation.







SAFETY UPDATE

As the harvest season for 2021 comes to an end, I can't recall any serious accidents or fatalities that occurred in our trade territory. I'm also happy to report that New Vision Coop had no reported injuries this harvest season as well. Harvest is a busy time of the year for our producers as well as our employees and there are several factors that create safety risks. From weather delays, equipment breakdowns and for several producers this year, poor stands from weather events and hybrid issues which made combining this year, difficult and time consuming - it has been a challenging season. These factors can often lead to poor choices and bad decisions which is when accidents and injuries occur. Harvest time accidents and fatalities can have a lasting impact on family, friends, and co-workers. On behalf of New Vision Coop, I would like to thank our producers and employees for looking out for one another and taking the time to work safely this harvest season!!

I would also like to make everyone aware that New Vision Coop will be sponsoring Bin Entry/Confined Space training for all SW Minnesota regional fire departments in early April next year. This training was originally scheduled for September 27th, but due to the early harvest this year, was postponed. Jack Volz with SASCS (Safety and Security Consultation Services) will provide this training for the fire departments in Worthington. Prior to this training, he will also provide training for our area producers on the hazards of grain bin entry on the farm along with farm implement safety. More information will be provided as we get closer to spring. Statistics show the majority of grain bin accidents occur on the farm, and I would encourage you to attend this training if possible. Again, congratulations on a successful harvest season and thank you for working safely!!

AGRONOMY UPDATE

Our fall agronomy season has kicked off to a great start, the workload has come in steadily and we have been day to day on getting application of fertilizer and lime completed. As most of you know, pricing on all fertilizer products has been on a steady increase.

Nitrogen has been the most significant increase week over week, month over month and has been a challenge on estimating on when it will come down. In my opinion, it will not come down before we need to think about spring at this point.

Demand coupled with tight supply and high production costs have played a large role in where we stand today. China, a major exporter in years past has held the globe at bay by not exporting any Nitrogen or Phosphate outside of its own use, causing a very tight supply. We have set records for UAN pricing already and many manufacturers are not up and running across the globe due to shortage of natural gas.

Another question I get frequently is, "When can we buy our chemicals"? We have come out with our chemical price sheet and have several chemistries available for you to purchase. Pricing on chemicals have leveled off but

generics on glyphosate and glufosinate have been significantly higher and will continue to be tight. I expect us to have an ample supply of most chemicals and for the couple that will be tight we have worked together with the sales team to produce a number of other tank mixes that will get the job done. I am confident that we will be able to serve and grow our business for FY 2022.

I am thankful for the season we have been given and hopeful that we can get another couple weeks to complete another strong fall application season.

Your New Vision Board of Directors has proudly approved the following based on the performance in our fiscal year ending August 31, 2021:



For the first time, New Vision Co-op will allocate the equity portion of 2021 patronage as "Non-Qualified" patronage. These dividends are equity only, but unlike Qualified dividends, are not taxable until they are revolved to the member. This gives our members the benefit of only paying tax on the dividends they receive in cash.

A letter confirming your passthrough of any 199A(g) will be sent out at the beginning of December and will be reflected on your 1099-PATR in January. Patronage dividend and equity retirement checks will be available at the annual meeting for attendees and mailed out the next day to those unable to attend.

\*Non-Qualified Patronage Allocation – a detailed letter explaining the tax treatment of this allocation will be included with all patronage checks. Please consult with your tax advisor.
